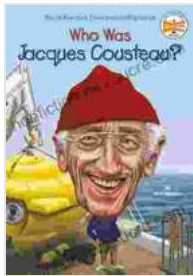


Who Was Jacques Cousteau: The Life and Legacy of a Legendary Oceanographer

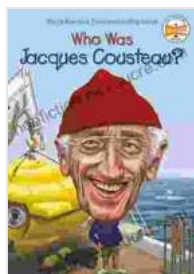

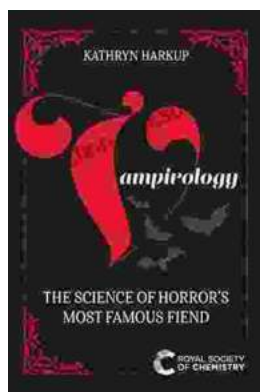
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
